Supreme Court Rules: Possession of controlled substances does not always lead to automatic deportation

On February 24, 2007 Families for Freedom and the Immigrant Defense Project of the New York State Defenders Association present a training for the general public about a recent Supreme Court decision *Lopez vs. Gonzales*. The court decided in this case that criminal convictions involving possession of controlled substances are not necessarily aggravated felonies. Previously immigrants were improperly denied an opportunity to apply for waivers of deportation.

People across New York & the Caribbean want to know what this case means for immigrant families & deportees. This training has answers. Community leaders, advocates, sympathizers and all are welcome to attend. The training will last two hours.
